## M'sia to slash carbon emission by 40 pct

KUCHING: Malaysia has pledged, during a recent meeting in Copenhagen, to reduce its carbon emission intensity by 40 per cent (based on the 2005 level) by 2020.

Minister of Natural Resources and Environment Datuk Douglas Uggah Embassaid the nation's effort towards this end was "on target and achievable".

the 'Best of Both Worlds Conference' held here yesterday. His text of speech was read out by the chairperson of the Malaysian Forestry Research and Development Board (MFRDB) cum Batang Member Sadong Parliament Nancy Shukri.

Uggah pointed out that green and environmental issues had become one of the worlds' biggest concerns in recent years.

"Progress has been slow, unconvincing and literally stunted. Economic and financial crisis overtook the concerns and focus on environmental matters, and climate change has taken a back seat," lamented Uggah.

However, Uggah reiterated that Malaysia was serious in doing its part for environmental conservation.

"I am proud to note that the Forest Research Institute of Malaysia (FRIM), with the collaboration of the University of South Africa (UNISA), is working on a proper environment

education initiative. In fact, a certification programme called Certificate in Environmental Education (CEE)' would be implemented next year."

Uggah said the CEE course would "fill the gap" in Malaysia' training needs, especially for preservice and in-service teachers and environmental practitioners.

FRIM director-general Dato Dr Abdul Latif Mohmod and the general manager of Sarawak Forestry Corporation (SFC) Wilfred Landong also spoke at the function.
