More than 100 attend furniture seminar

Furniture Industry Entrepreneur Deputy Minister of International Development' which ended yesterday was an initiative of the Dungau Sagan and STIDC general Ministry of International Trade manager Datu Sarudu Hoklai. and Industry to improve the overall level of those involved in the sector, especially Bumiputera.

It also aimed at diversifying innovation and productivity especially in terms of raw material usage, design and industrial management from training and research and development (R&D).
